This easy read Learning Disability plan has been developed with and based on the views of people with a learning disability and their parents and carers.



Over 7 months from May 2023 – November 2023 more than 361 people shared their ideas and these have been used to draw up the new easy read plan.

In September, all the ideas and things people had said or written were put together into the first draft of the easy read plan.




This draft easy read plan was shared with people across Norfolk and at the Partnership locality meetings to check it included what people had said and made sense.

Using all the feedback received, the final version of the easy read Learning Disability Plan has been drawn up and shared with Board members.



Alongside the easy read plan there will be a noneasy read plan.

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

A new section was added in Any Other Business called 'What is happening in your locality?'




This gave the group a chance to share information on events, groups or any good news.

The LeDeR programme is led by the Integrated Care Board and supported by the Integrated Care System. It's a team effort.


An Integrated Care Board plans and buys healthcare services for where you live



An Integrated Care System joins up all health and care organisations where you live to work together.

We have looked into the deaths of people with a learning disability and/or autism over the age of four



Anyone can make a referral to LeDeR. This is done online at https://leder.nhs.uk.

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Andy O'Connell - LeDeR Annual Report (6)



We completed 72 reviews for people with a learning disability and/or autism who died. This is less than last year



People with a learning disability and/or autism have shorter lives and die younger than people without a learning disability and/or autism




More than half of adults died in hospital.

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Andy O'Connell - LeDeR Annual Report (7)



Most people died of pneumonia. This is an infection in a person's lungs



The second most common cause of death was cancer. These included breast, bowel and lung cancer



Nearly half of all the deaths could have been avoided or treated.

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Andy O'Connell - LeDeR Annual Report (8)



Most people did not receive satisfactory or good care. Most people had a bad experience of health and care services.



There are really good examples of services using reasonable adjustments to support people. For example:



We are making services more accessible to people's different needs, for example using hospital passports

We are communicating better with people in a way they understand.



We are involving familiar carers in a person's support where this is needed.



Community and residential care staff need to be better at helping people live healthier lives by exercising more and eating better.

More people are having their annual health check which is good. This year 5012 people had an annual health check



More people need to have a health action plan as part of their annual health check. This year 4671 people had a health action plan



We are doing well to help people have their COVID-19 and flu vaccination.

We really need to help more people have their pneumonia vaccination




Hospitals need to be better at using the Mental Capacity Act to make sure decisions about people are being made in the right way



We need to try to give people a better choice about where they live

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Question: If you have problems with your lungs, can you still get the pneumonia vaccination?



Answer: You would need to ask your GP surgery if you can have one

More Care and Treatment Reviews and Wellbeing Reviews means we check people are being cared for properly in secure hospitals



The Learning Disability and Autism Teams in hospitals are very important. They work very hard to train staff and help patients who are ill.



GP practices are doing their best to make more faceto-face appointments

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

Services could be better at making sure people have the right medication for the right reason and make sure this is reviewed regularly



We need to make sure the care people experience is good quality and with people they trust.



We need to support more people to attend their cancer screening appointments, especially breast and cervical cancer

Better care co-ordination is needed for people with learning disabilities and/or autism



Care staff need more training and support to know when someone is becoming unwell and how to help them.

We will teach more people about LeDeR and how we can work better to support people with learning disabilities and autism

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

Finding a way for care homes and supported living to help people lose weight and be more active



Helping care homes and supported living, so more people can die at home if they choose too

On 1st December 2021, the government announced "People at the Heart of Care".



It is a plan to tell us how they want to make adult social care better.

Norfolk County Council is working hard to make sure we can do what the government tells us, using the money they give us.



So that we can do this, we need to use technology to help.



We have introduced 'Social Care Online Accounts'

Which you can use to look at documents that we send you and fill in forms.



The reason for social care online accounts, its a new way for people to receive information.



Testing it out with people who use our services (or their representatives).

Question: Will the user be able to update their own information?



Answer: No it will need to be done by your social worker

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Rachel Hyde-Smith - Social Care Online Accounts (4)



You do not have to have a Social Care Online Account if you do not want one.



Your account can be used by you or someone you choose.



To set up an account you will need an email account and a phone.

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Question



Question: Can a service user set up their own account?



Answer: Yes

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Rachel Hyde-Smith - Social Care Online Accounts (5)



You can receive documents online



You can see some information from your social care record. Documents are safe in the Portal.



If we ask you to complete a financial assessment, you can do it online.

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Rachel Hyde-Smith - Social Care Online Accounts (6)



You can do this at any time that suits you.



We are working with 3 of our teams and have set up over 150 accounts.



We are learning about things that we need to change.

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Rachel Hyde-Smith - Social Care Online Accounts (7)



We need to make it easier for people to register for an account, to do this we will provide more support.



We need to include younger people who like using technology. We are working with the Preparing for Adult Life team



We need to test it out with people who use our services.
